Ruby Bridges – American ICON



Ruby Nell Bridges Hall is an American civil rights activist. She was the first African American child to desegregate the all-white William Frantz Elementary School in Louisiana during the New Orleans school desegregation crisis on November 14, 1960. Bridges attended a segregated kindergarten in 1959.

In early 1960, Bridges was one of six black children in New Orleans to pass

the test that determined whether they could go to the all white <u>William Frantz Elementary School.</u> Two of the six decided to stay at their old school, Bridges went to Frantz by herself, and three children were transferred to McDonogh No. 19 and became known as the <u>McDonogh Three.</u>

Bridges and her mother were escorted to school by four <u>federal</u> <u>marshals</u> during the first day that Bridges attended William Frantz Elementary. In the following days of that year, federal marshals continued to escort Bridges to school.

Judge <u>J. Skelly Wright's</u> court order for the first day of integrated schools in New Orleans on Monday, November 14, 1960, was commemorated by <u>Norman Rockwell</u> in the painting, <u>The Problem We All Live</u> With (published in <u>Look magazine</u> on January 14, 1964).
